Incorporating teamwork activities into each meeting will help your team learn to work together while having fun.

The Challenge

In the **Robot Game**, teams design, build, program and test autonomous robots using LEGO® MINDSTORMS® technology. The Robot Game playing field reflects the real-world theme for this season. Teams select which missions to solve in 2½ minute matches. Season-specific rules release with the Challenge but some are evergreen (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=chSLW55gBAA).



In the **Project**, teams **research** a real-world problem in the field of the season's Challenge theme. Then they **create** an innovative solution to that problem (either by creating something that doesn't exist or building upon something that does). Teams **share** their findings with others. Teams that go to events must prepare a 5-minute **presentation** about their Project. Learn more about the Project in these videos (https://www.youtube.com/playlist?list=PLD25D83E836AB3AEB).
